SCHOOL DISTRICT AND COMMUNITY

Fort Bend Independent School District is located in the northeast part of Fort Bend County, immediately southwest of Houston and Harris County. The Fort Bend Independent School District encompasses the incorporated cities of Missouri City, Sugar Land, Fresno, Arcola, Rosharon, Meadows Place, and a small portion of Houston. It covers 170 square miles. Within the district are 45 elementary schools, 14 middle schools, 11 senior high schools, one alternative high school, two Centers for Learning and a Technical Education Center.

SCHOOL INFORMATION

Opening its doors in 1998 to the communities of Missouri City, Fresno, and Arcola, Hightower High School is FBISD's seventh and most innovative high school. Students from around the district are selected each year to attend the career academies specializing in Medical Sciences and Digital Media.

CURRICULUM:

- Hightower provides a strong academic program with more than 200 possible course selections including an extensive vocational-technical curriculum. HHS is home to FBISD's Medical Science and Digital Media Academies, which provide focused curriculum in these areas to prepare students for future careers.
- Options are available for students to earn college credit during the school day through the College Now program. CN courses currently at HHS are English 4 and US Government.
- Advanced Placement courses at HHS are available in English, Calculus, Statistics, Chemistry, Biology, Physics, U.S. History, World History, Human Geography, Psychology, Government, Economics, Spanish, Computer Science, and Art History. The pre-AP program offers courses in English, Math, Science, Social Studies, and Foreign Languages.
- UIL-sponsored athletic programs for young men and women are offered in football, basketball, tennis, track, soccer, golf, swimming, diving, volleyball, baseball, and softball.
- Co-curricular programs include choir, band, dance team, student government, service and academic clubs, athletics, speech/debate, Academic Decathlon/Octathlon, and UIL academic competitive subjects.
- Gifted and Talented programs are available in English, math, social studies, and science.
- Instruction is available for special needs through Special Education and Bilingual/ESOL instruction.
